Message from Margaret:

THE DEACON IN THE LITURGY: WELCOME TO THE REV. DEACON RAY WISHART

Among the many worthwhile reforms adopted by the Episcopal Church with the advent of the Book of Common Prayer 1979, was the restoration of the diversity of ministries as a cardinal principle of worship. We learn from page 855 that the ministers of the Church are the "laity, bishops, priests and deacons." Deacons are ordained by the bishop to ordained service, and must spend two years attending The School for Deacons. The use of deacons in the liturgy is an enhanced aspect of our worship service. The prayer book rubrics (directions written in italics) call for the deacon to carry the Book of Gospels in the procession, to proclaim the gospel, to read the Prayers of the People, on occasion to preach, to set the table and do the ablutions (clean up) afterward, and to do the dismissal.

The deacon has as his/her primary ministry the area of servant ministry or out-reach. In the early church they were to go out into the diaspora and minister to the poor, the widows, and orphans. Today, that translates into ministry to the poor, the oppressed, and the unchurched.

I am so personally glad that the Bishop has placed Ray Wishart here for diaconal ministry. You will be hearing about the various ministries we are putting together, as well as seeing Ray as part of the service. Please welcome warmly The Rev. Deacon Ray Wishart, and his wife, Diane. As we all know from history, deacons receive no salary. However, they do have discretionary funds, and you are invited to contribute to that.

Ultreya Scheduled

"Ultreya" is a Spanish word, derived from the original Latin, meaning Onward! It was in common use by pilgrims to greet and to encourage one another along the way. This word is now used by the Cursillo community to signify the meeting which is held after a Cursillo experience. This meeting may be between Cursillistas from one or several communities.

The Ultreya gathers together groups from a particular region and provides continuity by contributing to the maintenance of the Cursillo spirit and by revealing the reality of the living Church. In a climate of friendship, members share their life experiences based on the three tenets of Cursillo life, i.e., Prayer, Study and Action. Scripture. This sharing can be contemplative in nature or may deal with an evangelizing experience. These sharings from real-life experiences, serve as examples to all of us of the challenge which Jesus lays before His followers: "Go and do likewise."

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 25 FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT THE GREAT LITANY

An intercessory prayer including various petitions that are said or sung by the leader, with fixed responses by the congregation. It was used as early as the fifth century in Rome. It was led by a deacon, with the collects led by a bishop or priest. The Litany was the first English language rite prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer. It was first published in 1544. Cranmer modified an earlier litany form by consolidating certain groups of petitions into single prayers with response. The 1979 BCP titled the Litany “The Great Litany” (p. 148), distinguishing it from other litanies in the Prayer Book. Typically used on the first Sunday in Lent. Join us at 10:00 a.m. the last Sunday in February for The Great Litany.

Progressive Dinner Recipes If you missed it, try these!

Kathy Lopez' Baked Brie

Make an egg wash and use it to wash a wheel of Brie.

Put the wheel in a zipper bag with panko bread crumbs. Shake to coat.

Bake for 20 minutes @ 350°.

Spread raspberry (or any preserve you like) on a serving plate.

Be generous with it. You need to get some of the sweet each time you take some of the brie.

Place the brie on top and serve with crackers.

Joni Yon's Spinach Salad

As much spinach as you want; one (1) fennel bulb—cut the top (just below where the stalks form the shoulders of the bulb) and bottom off, cut in half (top to bottom), then slice as thin as possible around the core (following the ribs as best as possible).

Couple of oranges: Cut both ends off, then as much of the rind/pith as you can. Cut orange in half, and slice in rounds or segment the oranges (if you want to save any juice, you can add it to the dressing).

Dressing:

about 1/3 cup NAKANO Rice Vinegar flavored with Basil & Oregano, a good splash of olive oil, and a little of the juice from the oranges; whip it with inversion blender.

Assembly:

Layer spinach, oranges and fennel on a platter and drizzle the dressing just before serving!

Krystal Floore's Corn Chowder

2 cans of corn, 1 drained, one undrained

3/4 cup chopped onion

1 cup cubed potatoes

2/3 cups water

4 teaspoons chicken bouillon

2 cups cream or milk

1 tablespoon butter

2 tablespoons flour

1/4 cup cream or milk

In a pot, combine corn, onion, potatoes, water, and bouillon. bring to a boil. Reduce heat to simmer for 10 minutes or until potatoes are tender, stirring occasionally.

Stir in 2 cups of cream and butter. In a small bowl combine remaining 1/4 cup cream and flour and whisk until smooth. Add flour mixture to chowder. cook until bubbly and thickened.

If desired, add 10 oz. cooked fish (haddock, cod) and/or clams.

Carol Schilling's Sausage Lasagna

4 tablespoons olive oil

1 pound mild Italian sausage

2 onions, diced

3 to 4 garlic cloves, minced

1 cup dry white wine

1/4 cup minced fresh thyme

2 bay leaves

Salt & Fresh ground pepper to taste

Dash of sugar

Two 8-ounce pkgs "oven ready" lasagna noodles

Carol Schilling's Sausage Lasagna (cont.)

1 large can plum tomatoes & 4 to 6 fresh ones, chopped
3 cups (24 fl oz) tomato juice
¼ cup fresh basil, minced
¼ cup fresh oregano, minced
1 ½ cups (8oz) ricotta cheese or parmesan, crumbled
4 cups (1lb) shredded Fontina cheese

Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in saucepan. Add sausage and cook until browned (15 min.)

Transfer sausage to plate, set aside.

Add onions & garlic to saucepan & sauté until translucent (3 or 4 minutes)

Pour in wine and stir. Increase heat, cook, stir occasionally, until reduced to a glaze (3 minutes)

Stir in tomatoes, tomato juice, basil, oregano, thyme, bay leaves, salt, pepper, and sugar

(I use fresh ingredients, but feel free to use container spices, etc)

.Bring to boil, reduce heat & simmer for 30 minutes (stir occasionally)

Slice and add sausage to the sauce. Remove bay leaves.

Preheat oven to 350 F (180 C).

In ovenproof baking dish, spread layer of sauce and arrange layer of pasta on top.

Sprinkle ½ cup (2 ½ oz) crumbled ricotta & ¼ cup (1 oz) of Fontina cheese

Top with second layer pasta sheets & sauce; Sprinkle with more ricotta

Top with third layer pasta & more sauce, ricotta & fontina cheese

Arrange fourth layer pasta and remaining sauce; top with Fontina cheese

Cover with aluminum foil & bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes

Remove the foil & increase the oven temperature to 450 F (230 C)

Bake until golden brown, 15 minutes; remove from oven & let stand 10 minutes. Cut and serve

Anne Staley's Buttermilk ("ShooFly") Pie

1 cup sugar plus a little more

3 eggs

1/2 cup Bisquick

1 cup Buttermilk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 stick butter, melted

spray pie pan with PAM; pour in filling.

Cook 40 minutes 350* or to desired doneness.

(I cooled in fridge overnight but I bet it is good warm.)

God's Coffee

A group of alumni, highly established in their careers, got together to visit their old university professor. Conversation soon turned into complaints about stress in work and life. Offering his guests coffee, the professor went to the kitchen and returned with a large pot of coffee and an assortment of cups - porcelain, plastic, glass, crystal, some plain looking, some expensive, some exquisite - telling them to help themselves to the coffee.

When all the students had a cup of coffee in hand, the professor said: "If you noticed, all the nice looking expensive cups were taken up, leaving behind the plain and cheap ones. While it is normal for you to want only the best for yourselves, that is the source of your problems and stress.
